YOU GAVE ANNIKA CONFIDENCE TO TRY

Annika didn't know if she could finish school, but today she's a minister thanks to you and the Centre for Christian Studies!

Annika was worried. After graduating from High School among the top three in her class, she was struggling at university. She was reluctant to get tested for a learning disability or ask for extra help because she wondered, "What if it isn't a problem with learning? What if I am stupid?"

Annika felt diaconal ministry was the right path for her ... but the academic subjects were still a struggle. She was studying all the time and only getting C or D on papers.

Thanks in part to your generosity, the Centre for Christian Studies (CCS) introduced Annika to different learning styles. She says, "I like to relate what I am learning to real life or find the real-life experience before I understand it. I love exploring with my body, be it with plasticine or bicycling."

Annika's preferred way of learning wasn't accommodated in previous learning situations. But CCS valued experience in learning, thanks to you.

Reading was the biggest challenge. Your support supplied a supervisor and mentor who pushed Annika to get tested. When she did, she learned she had ADHD and difficulty with reading comprehension.

She figured out she could read better on a screen. Your gift meant that staff who heard about this difficulty could arrange for articles to be scanned instead of printed.

Staff worked to understand what Annika needed and coached her in her writing with detailed comments and questions. Their feedback reinforced the message that she was capable and had gifts for ministry.

Annika urges anyone who feels a call to ministry to check CCS out. "I don't want people not to try. It's not about being smart, it's about having the right tools to open your mind." You've made that possible.

YOU OPENED THE DOOR FOR PENNY

Despite failing at school, the Centre launched Penny Lewis into ministry. Here's Penny's story in her own words. You're going to love seeing how you helped her!

I first came to the Centre for Christian Studies to audit a course and the Spirit drew me into the fulltime program.

To learn how to write, I first had to do a preuniversity program. I had struggled all the way through school as a failing student. Going back to school meant going back to a place I had experienced failure. I felt very inadequate. I was so frightened about not being able to pass, but my young children encouraged me. They said I would never know if I didn't try—I got through!

I found learning at CCS was very different from my previous experiences of school. It was good for me because it was experiential. I had energy to learn and passion.

CCS provided a safe space for me to learn. It also gave me the confidence to continue my studies in the MDiv program at Trinity College and be ordained as a priest. CCS opened the door for me to move into ministry. It was lifegiving.

You helped transform Penny from a failing student into a capable priest.

YOU HELPED BARBARA LEARN TO LEAD

 \mathbf{Y} ou made it possible for Barbara McGill to change from feeling like not enough to a confident leader.

"I'd love to be able to do that." Barbara McGill was in awe of the facilitator's conflict resolution skills in a leadership course she was in at the Centre for Christian Studies. He demonstrated patience and respect, instead of saying 'you don't belong here'. Barb wanted to be that kind of leader.

In her previous profession as an early childhood music specialist, Barbara had felt like she was not enough. She had the skills but not the confidence. At the Centre for Christian Studies, you made it possible for her to understand herself as part of something greater; to trust that she is a leader and is everything God needs her to be.

Though she didn't grow up in the church, Barbara was drawn into it as a spiritual seeker. With her music background, she was soon recruited to lead the children's choir; however, Barb stumbled when it came to teaching the children what the songs meant. Her own understanding of Christianity was limited and she didn't really know how to speak about her faith.
